Police responsibilities

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- **Federal Criminal Police Office (BKA)**

Since 1951, there has been a nationwide criminal police office - the BKA. It also investigates in certain serious cases of crime with an international dimension. Since 1995 the BKA operates the "Infopool Prevention", a database which can be used by all actors of crime prevention. "Good-practice"-examples from Germany and other countries are presented in a brief description that is available on the internet.

- **Program Police Crime Prevention of the Federal States and the Federal Government (ProPK)**

Introduced in 1965, this nationwide prevention program aims to inform and educate citizens, media and other responsible bodies about various forms of crime and relevant prevention options. The program includes the creation of crime prevention publications and tools which support the local police in their prevention work.

German Congress on Crime Prevention

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The [German Congress on Crime Prevention](#) was founded in 1995 as an annual national convention for the field of crime prevention.

The aim of the German Congress on Crime Prevention is to present and strengthen crime prevention within a broad societal framework. Thus it contributes to crime reduction as well as reducing both the fear of crime and the number of victims of crime.

Since 2007 with the introduction of the [Annual International Forum](#) this is also true for the international perspective. With the AIF an international (English speaking) audience is addressed to share their experiences in crime prevention. We believe that while the world is growing closer research as well as experience should be disseminated within a broad professional framework.

German Forum for the Prevention of Crime

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The German Forum for the Prevention of Crime (DFK) was launched by the German Federal Government and the Federal Länder in 2001 as a nationwide body investigating causes of crime and creating prevention measures affecting society as a whole. It promotes federal and regional partnerships and acts as a networking forum for political, scientific and societal agencies and bodies. Other main goals are knowledge transfer and awareness raising on a broader societal scale. In its mission statement, the DFK underlines that the integration of the whole society and all institutions is essential for successful crime prevention approaches.

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crime prevention ...

- 4. ... is an approach for nearly all criminal offences**
